We had our annual Photo Fair last month, and although we couldn't make it, I heard it was a great event and many of the community turned up.





Pet Care with Dr Terri

TRAVELLING WITH YOUR PET

Travelling with your pet is often fun, but please restrain them well - not only to be safe but if you don't you may be breaking the law.

Did you know that travelling with an unrestrained dog in a trailer or ute tray is now an offence in all states, in Queensland, the offence incurs a maximum fine of \$8,625.

The safest way to transport a dog in the back of an open vehicle is in an enclosed cage. If a cage is not possible, tether your dog to the back of the ute. Use a harness to secure to a point in the middle of the cabin - never use a choke chain, this can tighten and cause strangling.

Make sure the lead or chain swivels at both ends and is long enough to allow comfortable movement but not allow them to reach the side of the ute. Take care in hot or dusty conditions, the back of a ute can become very hot.

Is it OK to drive with my dog on my lap?

New research revealed driving with your dog unrestrained in the car could be as dangerous as mobile phone distraction.

If you let your pet sit on your lap while you are driving, this is against the law and comes with a fine of up to 20 penalty points which is more than \$2000. You can be charged with an offence if your animal interferes with your driving in any way.

Restraining your pet is important for the safety of your pet. Small pets should be transported in secured carriers. Larger pets should be restrained in car specific harnesses, these have a wide chest plate (see picture). A simple collar clicked into a seat belt keeps your pet in one place but can cause serious neck injury if you have to break suddenly or are in an accident. It is also safer to keep your pets out of the front seat due to injury if your airbag is deployed.

If any part of your dog, other than its head, protrudes from the vehicle you can be fined. A maximum penalty of \$9,678.00 applies.

Leaving pets in hot cars

A fairly recently amended animal cruelty offence (breach of duty of care) now states that if a person is guilty of leaving an animal in a car that suffers heat stress or pain they can be fined up to \$266,900 or up to three years in jail.

Fine amounts and penalty point numbers can vary greatly but the important thing to note is that it is dangerous to drive with an unsecured animal.

Round the Ridges History: Helga takes a look back in time...

DID YOU KNOW...

In 1997 the Maroochy Shire council had plans to build a mega dump. It was planned for the quarry site on the Skyring Kenilworth Road, across the road form Wellington Road.

It was a suitable suite for the council as it was 'out of site and therefore out of mind.'

This was to dispose of all the rubbish from the Maroochy Shire, at the most North Westerly point of the shire. The dump would have drained into Belli Creek and thence into the Mary River. We could not let this happen.

We the locals, decided to fight this proposal. From our farm diaries, I see there was a meeting at Mark Griffin's house on Gilliland road on the 17th April 1997, followed by one on April 23, then a meeting on 30th April to organize the constitution .

By then the plan must have been well known, as we received a cheque from HinterNoosa in Cooroy on 14th May to help the new organisation.

Shortly after this Victor and I flew to the UK to visit his mother, and there is no more mention of the Mega Dump in the diaries, so we must have stopped it.

As the locals had come together to fight this unsuitable council plan on environmental grounds, the natural progression was to form an association to protect our local environment. A new group was formed, it was CRREA--Carters Ridge Ridgewood Environmental Association.

Helga Hill is a long time Ridgewood resident with lots of stories about the history of the Ridges.





Weeds

Conventional agricultural practice states that weeds, insects and disease are our enemies and must be controlled. However when it comes to crop health, weeds, disease and insect attacks are interrelated and can actually be sending us a message about crop vigour.

The Latin word *cide* meaning to kill or cut down has given rise to weedicides, herbicides, insecticides, pesticides, fungicides, bactericides, viracides. These chemical groups are further supported by roundup resistant breeding crops, where crops and weeds can be sprayed without affecting the actual crop. In turn this crop production ie: supported by the chemical NPK, soluble fertiliser industry and soil tests can determine fertiliser needs to maximise crop production.

The industrial chemical industry supporting agriculture has not been without its problems. Cultivation of lack of soil carbon has led to severe soil erosion and weeds are becoming resistant to herbicides, affecting streams and rivers which are suffering pollution and algal blooms.

Alternative ways for controlling weeds

There has been a fantastic knowledge bank developed regarding the control of weeds and what weeds are telling us in symptoms of soil fertility, deficiency, disease and insect outbreaks.

Some of the best reference books are:

- Charles Walters: Weed control without poisons
- Jay McCaman: When weeds talk

- Arden Andersen: Science in Agriculture, Chapter 12
- Philip Wheeler and Ronald Ward: The Non-Toxic Hand Book, Chapter 4 and 14

These references tell us that weeds don't always occupy niches that are not ideal for crops. Weeds are the first to colonise bare ground and often have different root systems to crops, some with tap roots that bring nutrients from deep in the soil up to the surface. Their root exudates support different microbes so they can harvest more and different nutrients. A good measure for seeing if weeds are dominating your garden or land is by using a Brixs read with a refractometer.

It's always good to note that Legumes don't really survive or do well in pastures as a brix reading of 4.7 for glycine siratro has been recorded for Legumes. A level below 8 means sucking insects like mealy bugs will attack the leaves and destroy the plant.

Always note that a brix level above 12 is required for healthy plants. If the brix level of the weeds are higher than the crop it is not a good outcome for crop yield.

One of the most important factors of soil fertility is balancing soil nutrition. When nutrient shortfalls or there are out of balance nutrients this can hinder crop growth and in turn favour weeds.

The following table (right) compares the ideal soil nutrients with soils typical of Mary Valley and the implication on weeds.

Comments on Soil Analysis table

- 1. Hydrogen level of 24% is high indicating low fertility.
- 2. Calcium to Magnesium ratio is too low at 1.7 to 1 and should be 6 or 7 to 1 giving rise to unbalanced soil poor structure and weeds.
- 3. The pH is 5.7 is too low: excess hydrogen and magnesium has one and a half times impact on raising pH than Calcium. Lime must be applied to get good results.
- 4. Phosphorus level is low and potash high. For good weed control a phosphorus to potash ratio of 2:1 is required. Apotash ratio to Phosphorus ratio of 4 to 1 makes weeds almost uncontrollable.
- 5. Sulphur at 27ppm is very low.
- Boron is one third the desired level causing legume symptoms of rosetting short peteoles.
- 7. Molybdenum level is too low to grow legumes and the brix level of 4.7 makes them prone to sucking insects. An application of 400g per hectare is required.

The soil nutrition and balance of nutrients is a major factor in encouraging weeds and poor pasture productivity.

Fixing the Mary river soil nutrition for good weed insect and disease control applies as follows per acre: 1 ton lime, 10 to 20kg solubor, 0.3 to 0.6kg sodium molybdenum and 50kg soft rock phosphate. The mixture would be

applied half in November and half in March so as not to overload the fertiliser on the soil surface. Rain is needed to dissolve the fertiliser




